

Featured Spotlight - Dr. Hannah Schacter

Hannah Schacter is an assistant professor of Psychology and affiliate faculty of the Merrill Palmer Skillman Institute for Child and Family Development at Wayne State University in Detroit, Michigan. She received her PhD in Developmental Psychology from the University of California, Los Angeles in 2017 and then completed a National Science Foundation Postdoctoral Research Fellowship at the University of Southern California from 2017-2019. Dr. Schacter's research focuses on understanding connections between adolescents' peer relationships and health outcomes. She is particularly interested in identifying mechanisms that maintain pathways from peer victimization to mental and physical health problems among adolescents, as well as investigating contextual risk and protective factors that exacerbate versus attenuate the plight of bullied youth.

Dr. Schacter is currently a co-Principal Investigator with Dr. Hilary Marusak (Wayne State Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Neurosciences) on a two-year R21 grant funded by the Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Institute of Child Health (NICHD) entitled "Effects of peer victimization on physiological markers of threat sensitivity in adolescents." This project investigates threat sensitivity as a putative psychobiological mechanism prospectively linking peer victimization to the development of anxiety among adolescents. The



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longitudinal, multimethod study incorporates survey assessments of peer victimization and anxiety as well as physiological assessments of adolescent threat sensitivity (e.g., startle eyeblink response) across three time points. The ultimate goals of the research are to develop an important diagnostic tool that can help identify peer victimized youth at heightened risk for developing anxiety and inform the design and modification of developmentally sensitive cognitive behavioral intervention approaches.

In other recent research, Dr. Schacter has investigated the health toll of peer stressors among youth with chronic conditions (e.g., asthma), the potential stress-buffering role of close friendships for bullied adolescents, and the impact of pandemic-related changes in schooling format on adolescent health and victimization risk. Her research team also recently concluded the fifth wave of data collection on their Promoting Relationships and Identity Development in Education (PRIDE) Study. The longitudinal study, which is funded by the Society for Research in Child Development (co-PI, Dr. Adam Hoffman, Cornell University) and a Wayne State University Research Grant, tracks the social-emotional adjustment, identity development, and health of approximately 400 adolescents who started high school in 2020 during a peak of the COVID-19 pandemic. Plans for a sixth wave of data collection and a corresponding daily diary component of the study are currently underway.

(1) 2022 Alberti Center Annual Conference

The 2022 Alberti Center annual conference will take place October 12, 2022 from 8:00 a.m. to 3 p.m. It is an in-person event but will also have a virtual/livestream option. Our conference this year will address *Centering Diversity, Equity and Inclusion to Promote Positive School Culture and Student Well-Being*. Our morning keynote speaker will be Dr. Janine Jones, Professor of School Psychology and Associate Dean for Academic Affairs at the University of Washington. (2) World Anti-Bullying Forum Call for Abstracts and Reviewers

The World Anti-Bullying Forum (WABF) 2023 will take place October 25 – 27, 2023 in Raleigh, North Carolina. The World Anti-Bullying Forum is an international and multidisciplinary forum whose purpose is to broaden our understanding of bullying, harassment, discrimination, ostracism, and other forms of violence among and against children and youth. The forum is a setting for multidisciplinary dialogues, panels, and meetings aimed at improving our understanding of bullying in all settings where children spend time and the efforts to stop and prevent it. The World Anti-Bullying Forum invites perspectives from different disciplines and areas such as (but not limited to) developmental and social psychology, sociology, social anthropology, education, gender studies, media studies, social work, health sciences, public health, childhood studies, political science, philosophy, and criminology. The World Anti-Bullying Forum also provides a platform for researchers and practitioners to present and discuss bullying in relation to societal and educational issues such as equality and equity, social emotional learning, rights and responsibilities, school climate, inclusion, exclusion, identity-based discrimination, etc. If researchbased knowledge is shared among those who work with and for children, and those who influence children's living conditions, we have a better chance of effective bullying prevention. Therefore, the World Anti-Bullying Forum is a place for dialogue among researchers, practitioners, stakeholders, and policy-makers.
